








Equal Sanitation for Improved Gender, Health and Education Outcomes

In Uganda 8 out of 10 people still lack access to adequate sanitation facilities





We build latrines that provide a safe and sustainable solution for all, including people with disabilities







this leads to...

- Waterborne Diseases: cholera, diarrhoea, and dysentery
- Education: higher dropout rates, especially girls of menstrual age
- Water Contamination: affecting both drinking water and agricultural use

Keep girls in school longer by breaking taboos on menstrual hygiene

In Ugandan schools there is a drop-off rate of 15% in girls' attendance when menstruation begins. This is due to lack of menstrual hygiene management (MHM) knowledge, facilities and products, and societal taboos.

Empowering people with WASH skills in EAU's training programme

Communities in Uganda often lack basic WASH products and skills. This creates WASH inequalities and detrimental health outcomes.

EAU's specialist trainers deliver WASH skill sessions, including how to make liquid soap, bar soap, shampoo, petroleum jelly (vaseline) and reusable sanitary pads.









Change Story: Hope for Women in Crisis, Jinja



Before: This charity in Jinja brings hope to women and young ladies going through crisis during pregnancy and childbirth. Many of the women were lacking skills and employment opportunities, and the charity did not have enough funds to support all those in need.

After: "Since we have been trained in how to make liquid soap and shampoo we are able to sell these products in the community. This has allowed our charity to help more women in Jinja in times of crisis.

Many of our girls became pregnant during COVID-19 because they were out of school so they didn't finish education.

Thanks to Equal Aqua we now have extra skills that we can use to start our own businesses."







99% of funds raised go directly to our projects in Uganda
