Since we were constituted in June 2004, we expanded rapidly to meet ever-increasing demand. Starting as the Eve Project, the name *Carers in Bedfordshire* came into use in 2006 and with it, the growth of services across all of Bedfordshire with over 700 carers accessing our services by 2008.

The next twelve years saw exponential growth; working in partnership with the NHS and the local authorities, service delivery grew year on year and today we have more than 11,000 carers registered with us.

We are now looking to build on this success to provide a greater breadth of service, and influence to ensure that Bedfordshire is the best place to be a carer.

Where we are today



We support young carer and young adult carers, as well as adults

- More than 11,000 carers are registered with us, including children.
- All services are totally free to carers, or attract only a small fee
- Our funds come from contracts for commissioned services, grants, trusts, donations, legacies and fundraising
- Our turnover is just over £1million
- We work closely with local agencies and professionals such as GPs and schools who refer carers to us
- We employ around 38 people, some of them carers themselves and are supported by 70 volunteers
- We have 11 trustees
- We are commissioned to deliver carer services in Bedford and Central Bedfordshire, dementia services in Bedfordshire and young carer services in Bedford




Our Vision

An investment in their development is an investment in the charity 's future.


Advocate with carers

Isobel is a parent carer

My son is eight years old. He's been diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder, ASD, ADHD, a heart condition, diabetes, asthma, sensory processing issues and anxiety. He's also double incontinent and wears nappies 24/7. As he's gets older, his diagnostic list gets added to, new challenges come and we adapt our lives accordingly.

He keeps me going, he's our whole world. If we didn't do what we do, his anxieties and frustrations would be far worse than they are. I rarely put my own wellbeing into consideration, it's all about him.

Having a child with neurodiverse conditions has so many challenges.

A lot of people think being a carer for your child is "just parenting".

They don't see the ups and downs, the sleepless nights, the incontinence issues, the vast amounts of appointments and the emotional toll it can take.

The punches and slaps hurt, the bruises are visible but we hide them and the tears are real even though no one ever sees them. 9 9

I got very despondent during lockdown – at one point, I couldn't even look after myself, let alone Sarah. I couldn't go fishing or to the Men in Sheds workshop where I volunteered. A neighbour lent me his home 3D printer and I've really got into it. In fact, I've ended up buying my own. An NHS carers grant helped me buy some supplies.



What Trustees do





You'll use your skills, knowledge or experience to help the Board reach sound decisions.


The Board agrees the strategic goals of the charity and reviews its work, finances and services, meeting six times a year. There is a finance committee and a governance and nomination committee. We have eleven Trustees who also act as guarantors with liability limited to £1.

This is a voluntary role - reasonable travel and other expenses will be reimbursed.

Advantages of becoming a trustee



- You'll be making strategic decisions about the future direction of the charity
- You'll keep our focus on carer-first services
- You'll gain valuable experience which may help you in future leadership or other roles
- You may learn new skills whether you are an experienced trustee or just starting out, there's always something new to learn
- You'll be volunteering for a forward-thinking, excellent local charity

Annual time commitment



- Four 3 hour business meetings
- Two half day strategy days
- Four meetings per year with your staff link
- Occasional networking or fundraising events
- Committee meetings if a member

Meetings are currently day time on Weds in Bedford or via Microsoft Teams video-conference call

Your first term of office is three years. You'll be eligible for a further two terms

Who are we looking for?

People who can meet the criteria* and have any of the following

- lived experience or working knowledge of caring for others
- all backgrounds as our current board is not as diverse as the world around us - particularly people with disabilities, minority groups and younger people (under 60)
- a background or experience in adult social care, communications, marketing, fundraising or IT and digital resources, finance and accounts.

If none of the above apply to you, you can still apply if you meet the general criteria



What happens next?



If you decide a trustee role is not for you right now, but you would like to contribute to our work in some other way, please visit our website for other ways to support us

- Read the trustee role description and person specification
- Contact us if you'd like to talk to us before applying
- Use the online application form when you are ready
- We shortlist applicants against the criteria in the person specification
- You may then be invited to an interview with trustees and invited to observe a trustee meeting
- We will police check and vet you against the eligibility criteria
- If selected, you will receive an induction and a trustee mentor
- Your appointment will be confirmed at the next Annual
 General Meeting
