The Role

This is an exciting time for World Jewish Relief's Humanitarian work, building on our highly ambitious strategy to continue to expand the quality and scope of our humanitarian capabilities. As members of the START Network and signatories of Charter4Change and The Climate and Environment Charter for Humanitarian Organizations, and endorsers of the Principles for LLA (Locally Led Adaptation), we are committed to the highest standards of humanitarian intervention. Recent operations include responses to disasters from Ukraine, Afghanistan, Colombia, East Africa, Bangladesh, Gaza, Nepal, and Haiti. We are eager to secure greater funding support to ensure we can deepen the quality and impact of our work through local partners ensuring we are meeting our obligations to the Core Humanitarian Standards.

Given the rapidly changing humanitarian context, this role will play a leading part in shaping our position in ensuring locally led capability is at the forefront of sector best practices. It will help to strengthen and grow our response capabilities, impact, and accountability of our humanitarian portfolio. The post will drive our response to international disasters, building programmes and partnerships to support both relief and recovery efforts. The portfolio includes a strong established climate resilience focus. The establishment and maintenance of effective local partnerships with credible local actors is essential to develop our Disaster Preparedness Initiative (a network of local partners in disaster prone countries who we work with to respond to large and small disasters). The role also requires representing World Jewish Relief at key humanitarian networks such as START, the Jewish Coalition for Disaster Relief, Bond Humanitarian working groups and Humanitarian Directors meetings.

Specific Responsibilities

Programme management

- To lead World Jewish Relief's humanitarian portfolio taking responsibility for developing the strategy, programme plans as well as manage their implementation, monitoring and evaluation.
- To travel after an emergency to lead on identifying partners and programmes and to make field visits to ensure programme and partnership progress is in line with objectives. It is anticipated that the post will necessitate approximately 4-6 trips overseas travel per annum.
- To lead the growth and evolution of new projects and partnerships that adhere to core humanitarian standards, fit with World Jewish Relief's strategy and enable respective resourcing to be mobilised.
- To lead our inclusion agenda, with a strong gender focus, bringing sector knowledge expertise and supporting the implementation of the policy plans across the organisation.
- To oversee our climate resilience programmes, ensuring that they are meeting best practice, capturing impact data and developing in learning and implementation.



Specific Responsibilities

Programme management

- To be the first source of information and knowledge on humanitarian work, and to build a humanitarian response strategy, bringing together learning and expertise from different programmes.
- To liaise where appropriate with Government and key actors (INGOs, local civil society, and networks) to strengthen the quality and impact of our programming.
- To support, guide and advise World Jewish Relief in developing and implementing monitoring and evaluation and impact assessment of projects/programmes including assisting in the design of programme reviews, project evaluations and research studies.
- To contribute to World Jewish Relief meetings and to the development of policy, plans and improved working practices, programme planning, budgeting, monitoring and evaluation.
- To line manage two members of staff based out of the London office, supporting them to achieve all operational objectives. Liaise with consultants and or other members of staff when required.

International partnerships

- To lead on our Disaster Preparedness Initiative (DPI) strengthening World Jewish Relief's network of partners with local partners agencies and seek to maximise the impact and effectiveness of our grants accordingly.
- To strengthen our DPI network of partner's knowledge of humanitarian best practice, and access to available funding, including to the START Network and our own Disaster Funds.

Humanitarian Sector knowledge and best practice

- To maintain our involvement and presence in the START Network, ensuring we are both contributing and benefiting from our membership. To lead World Jewish Relief's Start Rota responsibilities and represent us at all Start events as appropriate.
- To be aware of the START Network's protocols and standards so that we are well placed to lead on alerts and access funding.
- To ensure continued professional development of expertise and detailed knowledge of humanitarian best practice including Sphere minimum standards, Core Humanitarian Standards, climate action, Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) and safeguarding .
- To network, collaborate and advocate on behalf of World Jewish Relief to create partnerships with other INGO's and other humanitarian agencies from the Global Jewish community.



Specific Responsibilities

- To monitor emerging potential crises, including changes in context (slow onset crises) and the changes in risk. Provide information on the humanitarian context, (emerging and actual) ensuring up to date facts, figures and significant events, and where relevant plan for anticipatory responses.
- Actively engage with country specific and thematic NGO networks or research institutions to enhance learning and information sharing and represent World Jewish Relief at external meetings relevant to our humanitarian work.

Grant and Donor Management

- To guide and support the development of new programmes that will meet key donors' funding criteria, and to input into the respective proposal writing.
- To liaise with the Fundraising team to help coordinate support for fundraising initiatives, ensuring timely reporting and communication of programme activities where appropriate.
- To support the communication and marketing team with relevant information to help explain the work we do to a wide and varied global audience.
