### What is London Wildlife Trust?

London Wildlife Trust is the only charity dedicated to protecting London's wildlife, engaging local communities through outdoor learning, volunteering and access to our nature reserves. In a city facing development pressure and a rising population, where people are increasingly disconnected from their natural environment, we believe we can create real change.

#### **Our Vision:**

We manage 36 nature reserves and manage five 'hub sites' as centres for learning, volunteering and other urban conservation activities.

Over our 35-year history, we have delivered a wide range of projects to engage London's communities in the protection and conservation of wildlife, including work with children and young people, families, and socially excluded groups.

As outlined in our five-year Strategic Plan, one of our key aims is to provide hands-on, informative and inspirational outdoor learning experiences for Londoners, including 'the delivery of innovative programmes of activities for, and with, young people.'

### Our work with young people

As outlined in our <u>Strategic Plan</u>, one of our key aims is to provide hands-on, informative and inspirational outdoor learning experiences for Londoners, including 'the delivery of innovative programmes of activities for, and with, young people.'

One of our key areas of work with young people has been the Keeping it Wild programme, which since 2018, has successfully inspired over 1,500 young people aged 11-25 to become actively involved in the protection and promotion of London's natural heritage. Young people took part in nature conservation projects in their local communities, completed paid traineeships and were involved with our Young People's Forum with the overall aim of making nature more inclusive, accessible and relevant to young people living in London.

The project really set out to help change the face of the environmental movement! From there, we set up a dedicated Youth Programmes team at the Trust who are continuing to deliver the paid traineeship scheme, build strong partnerships with youth groups and organisations, and coordinate the Trust's Youth Board.

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Following on from the fantastic work that the Keeping it Wild Youth Forum achieved from 2018-2021 (including influencing our comms, Equality, Diversity & Inclusion work and creating the new Wild Youth Hub), we have placed youth voices right at the heart of the Trust's governance structure through our Youth Board, which was founded in 2022.

The Youth Board consists of 12 motivated young people (aged 16-25) who are passionate about London's wildlife and ensuring young people's voices are heard. Over the year we meet every month in person at one of our London Wildlife Trust sites to discuss and plan a range of agendas including: projects, events, campaigns, curating events, communication and youth strategy, blogs, podcasts and films. Members are also part of our mentoring scheme where Youth Board members are paired up with Trustees and Senior Management team, meeting to discuss personal goals every six weeks.

### What you will deliver

### The Youth Board will:

- Support the implementation of the Trust's Strategic Plan, particularly on how the Trust can better engage young people from a range of backgrounds;
- Share their ideas, experiences and opinions by contributing towards evaluation, strategy documents, blog posts, interviews, social media or film content;
- Create materials and curate events (including our annual Green Careers Showcase) to inspire more young people to get involved with the Trust;
- Represent the Trust at events (in person and online)
- Co-ordinate and lead Youth Board meetings with support from the Youth Programmes team;
- Represent the Youth Board at Board Meetings with Trustees and Senior Management Team and working group meetings with staff (e.g. outdoor learning, health and safety, conservation, equality, diversity and inclusion, comms and marketing);

### Year of 2023-24 Youth Board's achievements:

- Youth Board member Jazzie was involved in one of the stages of recruitment for the CEO role at London Wildlife Trust which included an interview with 3 candidates where Jazzie asked her own questions.
- London Wildlife Trust supported
  Mya Bambrick's Walk for Wildlife at
  Woodberry Wetlands seeing around 15
  young people gather for the guided walk
  and talk.
- Youth Board members Nishat and Jazzie attended the AGM and Jazzie gave an inspiring speech around what the Youth Board had accomplished over the year.
- Youth Board fed into the Volunteering Strategy giving their perspective of how the Trust can further the work of the volunteers at the charity. The session focused on areas discussing what motivates you to volunteer, how do you say thanks to volunteers, accessible volunteering, recruiting a diverse range of volunteers and promotion.

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


### **Further achievements:**

- London Wildlife Trust's Youth Board in collaboration with BTO's Youth Reps delivered a session focussed on Bird ringing, a guided walk and a Zine making workshop led by Nishat. The day saw 10 young people attend the event who all really enjoyed the session!
- Ryan and Charlotte represented the Youth Board at the Transport For London Youth Panel Event launching the organisation's Sustainability Policy at the Transport Museum.
- Action for Conservation hosted an Instagram live Q&A with one of their young ambassadors asking Youth Board member Queen questions surrounding representation in the outdoors and empowering young Black activists.
- The Youth Board has been creating a campaign for wildlife to ease Eco-Anxiety. Focusing on 3 main areas: Advocacy, Action and Wellbeing as well as the importance of connecting with other like-minded people
- Youth Board members Kam, Katie, Jazzie, Alan and Queen were involved in the London Wildlife Trust Brand Review taking part in workshops focusing on the 3 main strategic priorities for the Trust and ensuring youth voice was heard through the process.



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### What you will bring to the Trust

### Could you be what we are looking for?

- You are aged 16-25;
- Motivated to create change
- · Reliable and enthusiastic
- · Keen to take part in discussions, events, meetings, workshops and training;
- Excited about furthering youth involvement at the Trust;
- Interested in being an advocate for other young people and the role that young people can play in determining the future of wildlife and wild spaces in London;
- Interested in learning more about the environment, urban nature conservation and how to get more people from all backgrounds standing up for nature on their doorsteps; you do not need to have any experience with nature or the environment to apply

### Minimum time commitment:

- 1 year with the option to stay on for 2 years
- 12 core in-person meetings a year: one meeting in the first week of each month alternating between weekday meetings (6:30pm - 8:30pm) and weekend meetings (12:00 - 3:00pm)
- Optional socials around the core meetings
- Additional training and working group meetings as per your own interest, usually 1 2
   times a month for around an hour
- Attend at least 1 Trustee Board meeting per year
- Optional opportunities to get involved in other events and projects







## What we will offer you in return

- We will cover your travel expenses to meetings/events you attend and we will provide lunch/snacks/refreshments;
- We are also able to offer financial reimbursement (at London Living Wage) for some opportunities undertaken with the Trust outside of the minimum time commitment areas as outlined above (e.g. for being an ambassador and representing the Trust at external events);
- Mentoring from our trustees and senior management team (every six weeks);
- Regular training opportunities on a wide range of topics for your personal development including:
- » Youth Leadership;
- » Presentation skills, public speaking, charity governance;
- » CV/Careers workshops;
- » Campaigning workshops;
- Talks and presentations from staff (e.g species ID and habitat management, fundraising, project management, communications and marketing);

You can answer the application questions in writing, or in a video or voice note. Note that you can't save your progress, so make sure you're ready to submit your whole application. The questions we want you to answer are:

- 1. Please tell us about why you've decided to apply to the Youth Board.
- 2. Tell us about a project you've done that you're really proud of.
- 3. What are you hoping to learn or develop by joining the Youth Board?

Your answers should be no more than 1,000 characters each, or 3 minutes each if you are doing a video or voice note.
